We aim at creating technologically competent manpower as well as administrators and entrepreneurs by providing quality education in the field of computer, commerce and management.

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University. The college is running B.Com, B.B.A, B.C.A/B.B.A (Computer Application), B.sc (Computer Science) courses at undergraduate level and M.Sc (Computer Science) at postgraduate level on self financed basis. As an affiliation with Savitribai Phule Pune University the curriculum designed by university is mandatory to the college. In order to fulfill the goals and objectives of our college i.e. to make students technologically sound and globally competent we offer them various enrichment courses like MS-CIT, English Proficiency and Certificate course in E-Commerce. The college faculty participates in the workshops on syllabus restructuring and revision organized by affiliated university. The awareness among students about moral, social and ethical principles are created through various extension activities. The college takes feedback from students and other stakeholders regarding teaching and other activities either in written or oral format.

Teaching Learning and Evaluation

The admission process for various courses starts in the month of June. The college rigidly follows the reservation policies of Maharashtra Government during admission. Students admitted from disadvantaged community such as SC, ST, NT, OBC and SBC avail Government Freeship and Scholarship. The college is proactive to satisfy the needs of differently-abled students.

The execution of teaching learning and evaluation schedule is done by preparation of Academic Calendar prior to the next academic year. Teaching plan is prepared by each subject teacher according to the syllabus and as per academic calendar. Students are encouraged to learn by using various teaching methods like solving case study, making presentations, group discussion, project work, field work, seminar etc. The institute takes care that the students get benefit of effective learning by providing them modern teaching tools like computers, audio visuals, internet, CDs and e-books. The faculty makes better use of ICT for effective teaching learning process. The well stocked library of the college provides necessary facilities to students. The college always pays attention on the counseling of the students. Students are evaluated through various internal tests, term end and university examination. Necessary corrective measures are taken as per analysis of results. Remedial teaching, special guidance lectures are organized for students. The college Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays vital role in quality enhancement and sustenance of teaching learning process.

Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college has established Research and Development Cell to look after research activities, publications and presentation of research papers. Dr S N Shinde, the principal has completed his Ph.D in Computer Science from Savitribai Phule Pune University. Now seven faculty members of the college are pursuing Ph.D in their respective subjects. Four faculty members of the college have submitted proposals for minor/major research project to BCUD of Savitribai Phule Pune University. The college regularly organizes the expert's lectures imbibing research culture among the staff and students. The college is developing scientific temper, research culture among students through project work, task of research paper writing and organization of various competitions. The college has sufficient infrastructure facilities for research. The college library has sufficient collection of reference books and journals. The college provides ICT enabled facility in different segments through computers with internet connectivity, well equipped laboratories etc. The college has Wi-Fi enabled campus, so information access is convenient to staff and students. The faculty members participating in research paper presentation are supported with duty leave.

Consultancy is provided by the college faculty only on the social benefit basis and no revenue is generated from the same. The units of NSS, Board of Students Welfare and Rotaract club of CMCS are actively involved in institution's interaction with community. These units undertake social welfare activities for encouraging and sensitizing to students regarding social responsibility. Students actively participated in the Special Campaign for

cleanliness of Trimbakeshwar, Tree plantation, *Godavari Swacchata Abhiyan*, Blood donation camps, Donation to orphans etc. Students from NSS were volunteers during Kumbhmela 2015 at Nashik

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has 2 acres of campus with adequate infrastructure facilities. There are 13 airy and well furnished classrooms, 2 ICT classrooms with proper seating arrangement. The college has advanced audio visual multimedia Seminar hall with seating capacity of 300 students. The college has 4 well equipped computer laboratories and 1 Electronics laboratory for practical work of students. All computers, printers, copier machine and other hardware are internally connected through Local Area Network. The college Wi-Fi facility is password protected and the password is provided to college students, staff and non teaching staff only. The college has well stocked library including reference books, text books, journals etc. The college library has IT software which used for book circulation, book accessioning and generation all types of reports. The college library is using UGC's INFLIBNET library network. In the college library separate computers with internet connectivity are provided to students for information access. The college has 3 separate playgrounds of 3658 sq m, 994 sq m, and 162 sq m for various outdoor games. The college students actively participate in various sports competitions. The college has established Health center for health related issues of students. The proper arrangement of purified drinking water is available in the campus. According to need and requirements additional infrastructure added time to time as per norms of the parent institution.

Student Support Services

The college provides excellent student support services in various forms to facilitate the personality development, motivation and confidence building of students. Every year students from SC, ST, and OBC etc category are receiving financial assistance from the Central Government and State Government of Maharashtra.

Every year the college organizes medical checkup for the first year students with the help of MVP's Dr V N Pawar Medical College and Hospital, Nashik. The college conducts various enrichment courses such as English Proficiency Course, MSCIT, and Certificate Course in E-Commerce etc. The college organizes Annual Social Gathering every year. Along with cultural programmes various competitions like Rangoli, Flower decoration, Painting, Debate, Essay writing, Elocution, Cooking without fire are organized by the college. Training and Placement Cell of the college is actively working for training and placement of students. It invites various companies for the campus interview of students. Competitive Examination Guidance Cell of the college arranges various lectures related to MPSC/UPSC and Banking examination guidance for students. The college has registered Alumni Association. Sports students are given flexibility in attendance and evaluation as per Savitribai Phule Pune University norms. The college Student Council plays an active role in various curricular and extracurricular activities held throughout the year. Commerce, Management and Computer Science popularly known as CMCS College was established in September 2006 and is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University. It is one of the seven colleges of Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj Nashik started on Un-aided basis. Our parent institute is one of the largest educational institutions in India with a democratic setup, catering to educational needs of Nashik District. It was established by the Late Raosaheb Thorat, Ganpatdada More, D. R. Bhosle, Vithoba Patil Kandalaskar and Kirtiwanrao Nimbalkar in 1914. It is inspired by social reformers like Mahatma Jyotiba Phule and Rajashri Chhatrapati Shahu of Kolhapur. The motto of the MVP Samaj is "Diana" (Bahujan Hitaya, Bahujan Sukhaya) which means 'well being and happiness of the masses'. Following the motto of the parent institution, the college also focuses on developing students into good citizens and to create globally competent manpower for meeting the current and future industrial and social demands. The college is known for its quality education in the stream of commerce and computer science and the all-round personality development of students.

Academic Planning Committee in consultation with IQAC prepares the academic calendar in accordance with the academic calendar of the university. In the beginning of the academic year IQAC meeting is scheduled which includes discussion and implementation of the curriculum of the university. Under the observation of Head the department calendar and teaching schedules are prepared. The staff members prepare the teaching plan and teacher's diary for proper implementation of curriculum. Besides the traditional teaching the teachers are encouraged to use innovative teaching methods like PowerPoint Presentation, Seminars, Group Discussion etc.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Our college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, so we have to follow the curriculum designed by the University. The curriculum is designed by the Board of Studies of the Savitribai Phule Pune University and it is passed on to the students. The college faculty participates in the workshops on syllabus restructuring and revision organized by the university and if they have any problems they share it. The college encourages the faculty to attend workshops to update their knowledge and teaching practices. Our institution provides duty leaves, registration fees, travelling charges etc to the participating faculties. The institution also provides the Library, Laboratory, Computer, Internet facility to update knowledge and to conduct practicals. As per the guidelines of Board of Studies (Computer Science) Savitribai Phule Pune University, our college has conducted a seminar on 'Syllabus Restructuring of T.Y.B.Sc. (Computer Science)' on 24th January and 31st January 2015.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency?

As our college is affiliated to the Savitribai Phule Pune University, we have to follow the syllabus designed by the University. The University constitutes Board of Studies (BOS) in each subject which analyzes and develop the curriculum. The initiative is taken by the college faculty in the formation of Board of Studies to contribute to effective curriculum. Our Principal is the Chairman for Board of Studies in B.Sc. Animation. The college provides necessary facility for teachers to participate in different syllabus restructuring programmes organized by the University. At the end of the academic year, different HODs call a meeting of their faculties to discuss upcoming academic plans like allotment of subjects, extra activities and teaching techniques to be used. The work-load is distributed among the faculty members by the Head of different departments. Time-tables for delivery of theory as well as for the conduction of practicals are prepared in advance. At the beginning of the academic year the teacher concerned explains in detail the aims and objectives of the course to the students. The necessary reference books, journals, infrastructure, computer, internet facility, ICT classrooms are made available to the faculty as well as students.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interacts with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

For effective implementation of the curriculum the institution interacts with beneficiaries in various ways. 1) **Industry** - As per University curriculum faculties contact different industries for the student's industrial visit. Our postgraduate students have to complete six months industrial training as a part of curriculum. The placement cell of the college is always in contact with industries for training and placement of the students. Industry experts are invited as guest lecturers to teach some topics from the syllabus. One of our LMC and IQAC members Mrs. Ranjantai Patil is a well-known industrialist; she guides our students whenever needed. 2) **Researcher bodies** - Research scholars from different fields are invited to motivate our students and faculties. Faculties keep contact with various research centers and participate in research activities which are beneficial for

teaching. 3) **University** - The faculty members of the college are regularly in touch with the University. Some of the staff contributes to the University Board of Studies. Some pursue their Ph.D. in the University Departments. The BCUD of Savitribai Phule Pune University provides financial assistance through NSS, Board of Student Welfare for organizing Seminars, Workshop and Guest lectures. Along with this, funding is provided to purchase equipment, books etc. under quality improvement programme.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

Though the college has restrictions for framing the syllabus of its own, the University provides opportunities to the college to contribute in syllabus design through Board of Studies. The Principal of our college is Chairman of Board of Studies (B.Sc. Animation) of Savitribai Phule Pune University. Our institution always encourages our staff for their active participation in the syllabus restructuring, revising programmes, workshops and seminars arranged by the University from time to time. The college asks for the feedback of stakeholders and tries its level best to analyze and communicate it to the Board of Studies. The feedback from students is taken by the senior faculty members. The suggestions from parents and alumni are taken into account during the meeting. The suggestions and recommendations received from these are incorporated in the curriculum in the form of arrangement of guest lectures, industrial visits, various camps etc.

Yes, the college has developed curriculum for two courses in collaboration with other institutions.

- 1) Certificate Course for English proficiency.
- 2) Certificate Course in E-Commerce

1) English proficiency course:

In collaboration with MVP's Academy for Communication in English (ACE): Training, Development and Research Center (TDRC) the college has developed English Proficiency Course for all the second year students.

Need Assessment:

We need English in the changing context.

- 2. We need to know how to get English which can be put to use in our daily life for our practical purposes.

Design and Development:

Based on the needs the syllabus of the course is designed and developed by Dr. B.S. Valke, Director of Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj's Academy for Communication in English.

Planning:

For effective implementation of the course the trainers prepare a plan of 30 lectures. Diagnostic test is given on the first day and the final test i.e. Achievement Test at the end of the course.

2) Certificate course in E-Commerce:

Need Assessment:

- 1. Students should acquaint themselves with E-Commerce.
- 2. To create awareness and interest about E-Commerce among the students.
- 3. To increase the employability of the students.

Design and Development:

Based on the needs the syllabus of the course is designed and developed by the principal and faculty members of the commerce department.

Planning:

It is a short term certificate course organized for the duration of seven days. Every day two hours session includes theory, demonstration and short practical work.

For ensuring proper implementation of curriculum objectives, our institution conducts class assignments, group discussions, presentations, internal exams for students as mentioned by the Savitribai Phule Pune University. Then we make in-depth analysis of the results achieved by students. We conduct subject wise remedial teaching if necessary. We also invite subject experts of different area to explain the content of the syllabus/curriculum. Feedback form mechanism is also there for effective analysis of the teaching learning process.

B.Com faculty in our college offers vertical mobility. For the first year, students are offered to take any 4 subjects out of 9 and for the second year they are offered with 3 subjects out of which they have to select one. For the final year the student has to continue with same special subjects.

* Enrichment Courses

The existing courses are enriched by preparing the students to design small projects and presentations. Our students are also encouraged for research work apart from the curriculum one. Also the college provides all First Year Students with MS CIT Course mandatorily and English proficiency course (ACE) for all second year students. Our college has also established NSDC center under the scheme of **Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana** to inculcate the skills in the students. For the students of Commerce Faculty, the college has designed short term certificate course in E-Commerce.

Yes, our college is under the scheme of self-financing institute and affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University so we follow the rules and guidelines provided by the State Government and Savitribai Phule Pune University for self-financing courses.

The college established Rotaract Club in collaboration with Rotary Club of Nashik for social interaction. Special guidance lectures are planned for students under Board of Student Welfare scheme and National Service Scheme (NSS).

The curriculum itself contains practical and project work for the students up to UG level there are practical based on visits to different places and for PG level project work is there for which the students have to conduct some research work. The college invites the industrial experts to provide additional guidance on curriculum related subjects. - The institution has organized various guest lectures and workshops for girls students under Board of Student Welfare scheme.

One of the main objectives/missions of our college is to improve the soft skills in the students to cope with the dynamic market conditions and for this purpose our college has started English Proficiency Course by Academy For Communication in English (ACE), MS-CIT course as well as Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana under the guidance of National Skill Development Corporation. We have also designed a certificate course in E-Commerce for our students. These courses are useful to improve the soft skills and organizational skills of the students. They have also been allotted different responsibilities such as organizing cultural programs, competitions, seminars, workshops etc.

Better career options:

To provide proper career prospect, our institution always tries its level best in the form of establishment of Training and Placement Cell. Through this we arrange different career development programs and workshops by inviting experts from different areas. We always encourage our students to take part in different competitive exams and for this we have established Competitive Examination Guidance Cell in our college.

Community orientation:

As one of the missions/objectives of our organization is to make our students socially responsible. For achieving this objective we organize various extension activities like

- In collaboration with Rotary Club of Nashik the College has established Rotaract Club for Social and Environment Awareness.
- The college NSS Students has participated in seven days Shram Sanskar Shibir organized by our Parent institution for the cleanliness of Trimbakeshwar. They have also participated as volunteers in Nashik KUMBHMELA 2015.
- The college organizes blood donation camp every year with the help of MVP's Dr. V.N.Pawar, Medical College.

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The college makes wide publicity of its prospectus every year which includes detailed information about the college and all available programmes to the students for undergraduate and postgraduate courses along with its eligibility criteria and fee structure. The additional facilities provided to help students and parents are also included in prospectus.

The college has its own website "www.cmcscollege.ac.in" (www.cmcscollegenashik.org) which provides detailed information about the college to the people who prefer technology as a source of information.

The college publishe an advertisement in some local newspapers (Gavkari, Divya Marathi, Lokmat, Sakal etc.) for the commencement of admission to various programmes after the declaration of XII results.

Banners are displayed at the prime locations of the city near the college. Such as entrance of KTHM College, at Prasad Circle and outside of the college.

Any other (Specific): The whole admission process is planned by the admission committee and the decisions of admission committee are conveyed by displaying notices for the same. The principal is the chairman and head of the department who plays an important role in it.

The transparency in the admission process is maintained by providing rules and regulation laid down by Savitribai Phule Pune University and the government of Maharashtra in the college prospectus. The admission process is fully computerized and candidates are informed about it by displaying notices on notice board as well as through telephonic communication. The Merit list of PG admissions follows the rules and regulations of reservation as per government of Maharashtra.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.

The college has its own choice for admission of candidates for self financed courses. However, it adheres to its mission of providing quality education to all for overall development. Hence, the student ratio of the college is often a healthy mix of girls who with different economic, social and geographical backgrounds.

Undergraduate Course:

The admission of undergraduate courses starts in the month of June. The students are supposed to take admission within the given period. The date of the sale of application

forms with the prospectus is displayed on the main notice board of the college. The college office manages selling and accepting the forms. Admission committee attends students' enquiries and checks the form carefully and guides them. Students submit the admission forms along with the necessary documents (HSC Mark sheet, Leaving / Transfer Certificate, Caste and Income Certificate) to the admission counter.

The admission procedure of direct admission to the undergraduate programme is based on "FIRST COME FIRST SERVED" basis.

As per the guidelines issued by Savitribai Phule Pune University, admissions are given on the basis of the previous year's (HSC) score of the candidate for undergraduation. In order to fulfill the intake capacity, the college has provided the fee installment facility.

Course wise Eligibility criteria for admission:

F. Y. B. Sc (Computer Science):

Higher secondary school certificate (10+2) science stream (with Mathematics) or its equivalent examination as per the Savitribai Phule Pune University eligibility norms. Reservation and relaxation is as per the government rules.

F. Y. B. C. A. / F.Y.B.B.A. (Computer Application)

- a) Higher secondary school certificate (10+2) from any stream with English as passing subject with minimum 40% marks in aggregate.
- **b**) Two years diploma in pharmacy course of Board of Technical Education, conducted by the government of Maharashtra or its equivalent.
- c) Three year diploma course (after S.S.C. i.e. 10th Standard), of Board of Technical Education conducted by government of Maharashtra or its equivalent.
- **d)** Minimum Competency and Vocational Course (MCVC).

F.Y.B.B.A:

- a) A candidate for being eligible for admission to the degree course in Bachelor of Business Administration shall have passed 12th standard examination (H.S.C. 10+2) from any stream with English as passing subject and has secured 40% marks at 12th standard.
- **b)** Two years diploma in pharmacy after H.S.C., Board of Technical Education conducted by government of Maharashtra or its equivalent.
- c) Three year diploma course (after S.S.C., i.e. 10th standard) of Board of Technical Education conducted by government of Maharashtra or its equivalent.
- **d**) Minimum Competency and Vocational Course (MCVC).

F.Y.B.Com.:

Higher secondary school certificate (10+2) commerce or science stream with minimum 35%.

Postgraduate Course:

M. Sc. (Computer Science):

The candidate should have a B.Sc. degree with Computer Science as principle subject with minimum 50% or its equivalent and 45% for reservation.

Admission: Admissions are given as per the selection procedure / policies adopted by the respective college, in accordance with conditions laid down by the Savitribai Phule Pune University. Reservation and relaxation is as per the government rules.

The college has its admission committee constituted of head of the respective departments along with one person from each department. The criteria for admission are based on the marks secured in the last qualifying examination. The members of the committee decide about admission procedure and if necessary make modifications. In this way the admission process is reviewed yearly to run it smoothly. In case of any discrepancy the management also provides guidelines for transparent admission process. The college has administrative staff to maintain database of student profile as per cast, percentage, stream, state, nationality at the HSC board. The same statistics is put in front of the admission committee for further assessment. This has help to improve the admission status and process.

Outcome:

- The top management also allocates seats based on the demand for courses.
- Selection takes place as per government norms.
- Fees installment facilities are provided to students as per need.

SC/ST/OBC:

The college rigidly follows the reservation policies of government. To ensure that the strategies adopted by government in the creation of equity and provision of access to the SC/ST and OBC applicant are implemented. The scholarship and free ship is provided to SC/ST/OBC as per government rules.

Women:

A large portion of the students seeking admission to CMCS is of girls. All the basic facilities are provided to them. The college has appointed a ladies' representative in student council for to help girls. To ensure overall development of the girls and to solve their problems college has a Grievance Cell and Women Welfare Committee. The hostel facility is provided for girls through the parent institution.

Percentage of girl students for the academic year 2015-16 is 45.41%, 376 girl students out of 828 total strength.

Differently abled:

The college has made the following provisions for differently abled students:

- 1. Shifted classrooms to ground floor (FYBBA, SYBBA).
- 2. During construction care has been taken by constructing ramp side by the stairs for differently abled students.
- 3. The college has made a provision of lift (Proposed).

Economically weaker sections:

The students who belong to this section are allowed to pay fees in installments. The parent institution Maratha Vidya Prasarak has a provision of 'STUDENT WELFARE ASSOCIATION' which works for free admission of deserving candidates. The college has a provision of 'POOR BOYS FUND' for such sections. Earn and learn scheme under Board of Student Welfare is available for students from economically backward class.

Sport Personnel:

Students who show excellence in sport activities are also given preference at the time of securing admission. Fee installment facility is provided based on the performance of the candidate in various sports.

Any other:

Students are made aware of scholarships for **SC/ST** and minority and the college helps them in filling application forms.

Comment on the trend:

B.Com: It seems that the strength is increasing every year for B.Com.

BBA: During the last five years it seems the strength is stable upto certain extent but in 2012-13 Maharashtra Government ceased the scholarships for students of backward classes (except SC/ST). That is the reason of decrease of admission.

BCA: 2010-2013 the trend is stable but 2014 onward it shows a decline trend because Maharashtra Government ceased the scholarships for students of backward classes (except SC/ST),

B.Sc. (Comp. Sci.): The trend shows decreasing pattern after 2013 because AICTE dropped down the merit for the admission of engineering students.

Action initiated by the college: Increasing focus on student and parent counseling, banners are displayed at public places, alumni meet was held and appeal was made for word of mouth publicity, it really worked the trend shows the increase in the course of B.Com, BBA, B.Sc. (Comp. Sci.) during 2014, and 2015 admissions.

Our college is proactive to satisfy the needs of differently-abled students. The college follows the reservation norms as per the state government rules for admission to the differently-abled students.

The college has made provisions for differently-abled students:

- a) Making changes in timetable and shifted classrooms to the ground floor.
- b) Availability of lift near the stair case (proposed).
- c) During construction care has been taken to create a ramp.
- d) Highly supportive teaching, non-teaching staff, co-operating with student.
- e) Separate seating facility for such students during examination.
- f) Extra time allotment for such students at the time of examination.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

"YES" there is a provision for accessing student's knowledge and skill before the commencement of the program. The orientation programme is also arranged for the first year students.

- a) Introductory lectures conducted for students.
- b) Overview of last academic performance of the students.
- c) Communicating the syllabus to students.
- d) Interview for selecting optional and special subjects.

The institution assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills at the beginning of the academic year by interacting with students in the class. The staff members collect information from students regarding previous examination, background, sports and cultural activities. The optional and special subjects for FY / SY B.Com. students are allotted on the basis of personal interview and previous examination marks secured by students. The diagnostic test of students is conducted for English Proficiency Course.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

To bridge the knowledge gap of students from different backgrounds separate sessions are organized. The college organized English Proficiency Course for the student of second year and a computer literacy course (MS-CIT) for the students of first year. The following lectures/workshops/seminars are organized for students in the last five years:

- a) Seminar on personality development.
- b) Lecture on Competitive and Banking Examination guidance.
- c) Workshop on Women Personality Development.
- d) Seminar on Cyber Security.
- e) Lecture on Entrepreneurship Development.
- f) Lecture on UPSC/MPSC guidance.
- g) Student health Workshop.
- h) Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana through NSDC (National Skill Development Corporation). Skill development programme is organized in the academic year 2015-16.
- i) Certificate course in e-Commerce.
- j) Remedial Lectures are organized by each department for slow learner.
- k) Parent-Teacher meetings are organized to communicate students' performance to parents.

The syllabus is completed within the given time and the revision of the syllabus is done every year. Students are encouraged to solve previous year question papers.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college sensitizes its staff and students through a variety of approaches and activities on issues of gender, inclusion, and environment. The following are the ways which we have adopted for this:

- a) Seminars and lectures on women's safety were organized by Board of Student Welfare in the academic year 2014-15.
- b) Hemoglobin test for girl students.
- c) Various competitions such as rangoli, flower decoration, cooking without fire, painting, mehandi etc. are organized on the occasion of Annual Social Gathering.
- d) The college has also established Grievances Redressal Cell and Women Welfare Committee for the girl students.
- e) Parent Institution provides scholarship facility to girls students.

For Environment Awareness:

- a) Environment Awareness course is a compulsory subject for S.Y.B.Com. and S.Y.B.Sc. (Comp. Sci.) students to create awareness about environment.
- b) The college has also organized various cleanliness activities such as Campus Cleaning, Godawari Sachhata Abhiyan, Shramsanskar Shibir (seven days) at Trimbakeshwar.
- c) The college always encourages environment protection related issues. We always encourage our students and staff for Tree Plantation. On the occasion of Maratha Vidya Prasarak's Samajdin (19 August) we organized an Eco-friendly product exhibition.

- d) In collaboration with Rotary club of Nashik, the college has established Rotaract club to create awareness among staff and students regarding gender and environment issues.
- e) In our college we have a facility of Rain Water Harvesting.
- f) The World Environment Day is celebrated as 'No Vehicle Day'.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The teachers identify advanced learners during lectures and practicals. The subject teacher conducts the class test and may also give students an assignment. The scores secured at test help to identify advanced learners. Extra reading material like reference books, e-books and assignments is provided to supplement their subject knowledge.

- They are encouraged to participate in various seminars and competitions like debate, Ad Mad shows, elocution, essay and extra-curricular activities etc.
- They are the members in various college committees.
- Various skill based programmes are organized for these students such as English Proficiency Course, Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana by National Skill Development Corporation, Resume writing workshop etc.
- They are encouraged to write research articles, present research papers and contribute for the college magazine.
- Special guidance lectures are organized for them.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
 - a) The information about the academic performance of students from different categories is collected by maintaining the attendance and performance during theory classes, tests and practicals. After identifying the needs, necessary measures are taken to promote growth of students. The faculty takes special efforts for the enrichment of the learners. The scholarships offered to these students are carefully distributed by the college office within given time. The Placement Cell actively works for the training and placement of these students.

The following things are analyzed by teachers after conducting tests in the classrooms:

- 1. Score of the test helps to identify slow learners and such students are counseled by teachers and provided notes also.
- 2. Remedial classes are conducted to improve morale of the students.
- 3. The interaction between slow learners and advanced learners to improve communication and team work.

- 4. Use bilingual method of teaching (If needed).
- 5. For economically weak students the college has a provision of Poor Boys Funds.

These efforts have proved effective and they reach average category students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc)

The college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University. The University has established the teaching learning and evaluation schedules. At the end of the academic year, in a month of April the meeting of staff members is called by the Principal and academic planning of the next year is fully discussed. The allotment of subjects, courses and classes etc is done by the HOD in the department meeting. The academic calendar is prepared according to the academic year in consonant with University. The schedule of examination and evaluation of the next year is prepared in advance and communicated to students and teachers. The planning of teaching learning process is as follows:

a) Academic Calendar:

The Academic Planning Committee in consultation with IQAC prepares an academic calendar which includes time table, tentative examination, internal examination (term/semester), scheduling, NSS, sports, cultural activities as well as holiday activities and events of the particular semester. The Academic Planning Committee comprises the principal, all the heads of department and senior faculty members.

- c) The evaluation system is based on the performance of the students on following criterias:
 - 1. To judge the student's performance in the internal exams, term end exams are conducted.
 - 2. For certain courses students are assigned project work.
 - 3. Viva-voce, oral examination, power point presentation, seminars carry weightage.
 - 4. Attendance records, extra tutorials, home assignments are also included in the internal evaluation.

d) The schedule and planning for the examination are finalized by the examination committee and informed well in advance to students.

Marks secured by students in all subjects in the internal examination are informed to them. The final university examination is conducted as per the norms of Savitribai Phule Pune University. The student has an opportunity to apply for verification and revaluation for the university examination answer sheets within seven days from the declaration of the results.

Notices, circulars regarding syllabuses and examination pattern issued by the university are conveyed to faculty members and students from time to time.

- The college has a full time internet facility to get knowledge from the globe on various issues and academics.
- The college encourages the faculty to participate in orientation programmes, refresher courses and various training programmes.
- Students and teachers participate in different workshops, seminars and expert lectures are organized in the college or in other colleges.
- Faculty development programmes are organized and expert guidance is provided for the development
 - of faculty members.
- The famous personalities, authors, academicians, businessman are invited to the college to give speeches and guidance to students.

The staff provides counseling to students for the optional subject selection, selection of career examination pattern, participation in various sports and cultural activities, seminar workshop etc.

The faculty pays a careful attention to the attendance, performance of the students and necessary guidance; remedial teaching is planned for them.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Following innovative teaching methods adopted by faculty.

For Student:

Lecture Method: To teach concepts and theoretical part from the syllabus.

Interactive: For two way communication and proper understandings of the topic. It may be in the form of asking questions answers. Discussions take place between students and teacher or students and students.

ICT classroom: To make learning interesting and effective. It includes computer, LCD projector, internet, smart boards etc.

Project based: Most of the subjects from commerce and science faculties including small research project work. The necessary guidance is provided to students about project work.

Experimental: Quiz competition, case studies, fun fair of commerce, management games, review writing, research paper writing.

Industrial and field visits are organized for real life experience.

Power Point Presentation and group discussion: Active involvement and confidence building.

Solving previous years' question papers.

For Faculty enrichment:

Faculty Development Programme. Encourage faculty for research.

Teachers are encouraged to use computers, power point presentations, internet, film, library resources to enrich teaching and learning.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching learning process?

The college library is collection of 4750 books, 30 journals, 350 CDs, IT Soft library software, OPAC and 7 daily newspapers. The library provides 4 computers with internet connection.

The Reading room facility is available to students. The separate Research Cell is established in the library.

The college has a Library Advisory Committee who is looking for requirements of books and journals needed for teachers and students. The unlimited access of books to the teachers and each student is issued with one book per week on the borrow card. Journals are also made available to the students in the reading room. DVDs are available for computer, English and management subjects.

The library collection reflects the curriculum of undergraduate and postgraduate courses, research and competitive examinations.

The Head of the department gives the list of required books to the librarian and on the basis of that the necessary books are ordered and made available to students and staff.

Library Services:

Activities to encourage use of reference books:

- Topics for presentation are assigned to students and names of reference books are announced in the class.
- Discussion of the important reference books needed for study in the classroom during lectures.
- Encourage the students for competitive examination.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Academic Planning Committee plans the event well in advanced. Every teacher completes the curriculum according the plan, so it seems to be easy to complete this curriculum. If there are some unplanned activities or events or due to some unforeseen circumstances or some cultural events (For example-KUMBHMELA) there may be a problem in completing the syllabus within the stipulated time period. Under such situation the teachers who are facing the problem in completing the syllabus conduct extra classes as allotted by HOD.

In case of long leave taken by a teacher they have to conduct extra lectures or the syllabus is completed by the other teacher appointed for same subject.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The Principal, IQAC coordinator and HOD monitor the learning process.

Observation of teachers is conducted by the Principal and HOD and necessary suggestions are given to the respective teacher to initiate corrective actions.

The performance of the teacher on the basis of the result analysis is carefully studied, recommendations and corrective actions are provided to the teacher concerned for improvement if needed.

The students are evaluated through various internal tests, term end and University examination. Necessary corrective measures are taken as per the analysis of results. Remedial teaching, special guidance lectures are organized for students.

The college has a strong feedback collection system. The quality of teaching is evaluated by collecting the feedback from students. Anonymous feedback is taken from the students every year. Confidentiality and transparency is ensured in this process and the analyzed data is presented to the Principal. After analyzing the feedback the teacher concerned is informed for improvement in the teaching process. Suggestions are also taken from students on the different aspects of teaching and these suggestions are shared with all the teachers. Even at the end of the academic year appraisal of teacher is also done by the Principal and the top management. These help teachers to introspect and improve their teaching skills.

The management of the college recruits competent and expert teachers as per norms of the University Grant Commission. The teachers are recruited through the selection committee, constituted as per the rules of Savitribai Phule Pune University.

As Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj is a parent Institution of CMCS College, the recruitment process is done by the parent institution in order to reach the best teachers available. The institution advertizes in the newspapers. From the received applications,

eligible candidates are shortlisted and called for interview. The selection committee is constituted as per the norms. The eligible and competent candidates are selected by the selection committee. After the selection the top management allots selected candidates to different colleges.

In case of self financed courses if no candidate is found suitable then the management may recruit qualified but not eligible candidates (without SET/NET or Ph. D. qualification) through Local Selection Committee. These candidates are appointed on temporary basis for the academic year and encouraged to qualify SET/NET or Ph. D.

Faculties are motivated and encouraged to participate and present research papers at different levels of seminars and conferences and are also encouraged to participate in various workshops. Adequate support and facilities are provided to them by way of infrastructure and guidance.

The faculty members are promoted and encouraged to avail research grants, leave for study, facilities for research, academic publication and participation in conferences, seminars, refresher courses, and orientation programs. The Faculty has not received any award or recognition at the state level or national level but within a short time span the college has achieved a benchmark in the field of quality education.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The college collects feedback of the teachers from students. Students give feedback of individual teaching staff members on their teaching skills, knowledge, communication, punctuality, guiding skills, creativity, problem solving abilities and then attitude towards the students. Confidentiality and transparency is ensured in the process of data collection and analysis of feedback form. The reports are then presented to the principal.

A counseling session has been conducted with faculty members by the principal and detailed discussion has been carried out on how to improve. Suggestions are also taken from students on different aspects of teaching.

At the end of the academic year self appraisal is also conducted and the principal gives his appraisal rating for individual teaching.

Parents' Feedback is taken during parents meeting. A Suggestion Box is provided to get feedback from students.

The Feedback on Guest Lectures is also taken from students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The college provides complete evaluation related information and process to students by displaying it on the notice board as well as on the website of the college. The teachers also communicate evaluation processes from time to time in the classroom.

The students are made aware of the University examination pattern, Internal test, term end exam, practicals, oral evaluation method, scheme of marking and eligibility criteria required for the final examination.

If needed the instructions regarding examination are communicated to students by circulating the notice in the classroom.

The evaluation is an important part of teaching and learning. Teachers are encouraged to attend workshop on examination reforms. Some of the teachers are the members of the Academic Counsel; they come to know the change in the evaluation process in the meetings. The college also organizes meeting to clarify evaluation process to teachers. In the department meeting Head decides the policies regarding internal evaluation in consultation with other staff member.

Local Management Committee (LMC) meetings are organized and suggestions are taken from them for the improvement of performance.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The University has fixed the pattern of evaluation. On the basis of norms provided by Savitribai Phule Pune University various examination are conducted in the college.

The University adopts various evaluation reforms as mention below:

■ The College Examination Officer (CEO) is appointed as per instructions of the University, who is responsible for smooth conduct of examination in the college. The CEO is the connecting link between the college examination cell and the university examination department

The University has adopted the following Evaluation System:

- Online Registration for examination.
- Barcode System Implementation.
- Online Question Papers.
- Photocopy of Answer Sheets also provided on demand.
- Revaluation of Answer Sheets.
- Term End Examination.
- Strong room.
- First Year evaluation is given to college.

The college has authority to reform the structure of internal examination. The college includes seminars, presentation, report, objective questions, group discussion as a part of internal evaluation. As per the reformation of University Examination System the changes are also made in the Examination Cell of the College.

- Strong room.
- CCTV surveillance of Examination Cell.
- Modern and fast operating Copier Machine for Question paper printing.
- Internet Facility.
- Telephone connection.

The revised Ordinances are followed during the first year result preparation.

- 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?
 - The evaluation reforms of the University are mandatory to every college.
 - The college maintains examination records properly.
 - If a student has any doubt in evaluation then they can demand the photocopy of his answer sheet.
 - The college has essential infrastructure regarding evaluation system.
 - The university approved teacher is appointed as College Examination Officer (CEO) who is responsible for smooth conduct of examination in the college.
 - A separate examination cell is working in the college which is well equipped with a Strong room, Safety Cupboards, Internet and Telephone connection, Printer, CCTV surveillance.
 - The proper information is provided to students about examination schedules, revaluation process, photocopy applications etc.
 - In case of any problem members of examination committee help the students.
 e.g. for filling online examination forms and deletion of the unnecessary subject from exam forms.
 - Examination notices are displayed on a separate notice board.
- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.
 - Under the formative evaluation approaches adopted by the college we conduct the term-end examination, internal evaluation tests, assignments, class tests, group discussions, presentations etc.
 - Among the Summative evaluation approach we prepare students for the final University examination by getting them to solve last few years question papers of University examinations, a final project, a practical exam etc.
 - Students' academic progress is monitored regularly through formative methods. On the basis of evaluation advanced learner are identified by the departments.
 - Remedial lectures are also organized for the students who could not perform satisfactorily.
 - Advance learners are motivated to get engaged in co- curricular and extra-curricular activities and encouraged to face more challenging jobs.
 - The college encourages students to participate and attend intercollegiate events.
 - Students also have to undergo a mini project, a paper presentation, seminars etc.
- 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.
 - The college maintains transparency in the internal assessment and term end examination.

- The college examination committee is ensuring the confidentiality and transparency in the assessment of students' progress in the internal evaluation. The University norms of evaluation are followed by the college.
- Students can discuss the performance of the internal evaluation tests in the classroom and teachers show checked answer sheet and provide them necessary guidance for improvement.
- Parents are informed about the progress of their child. The list of toppers is displayed on the notice board.
- The behavioral aspects are judged through attendance, behavior of the student with teachers and with other students in the class, participation of the student in extracurriculum activities of the college.
- The students are encouraged for Power Point presentation, project and research for independent learning.
- IQAC frame policies regarding internal evaluation.
- Internet and WI-FI facility is provided to students to gain insights into the current scenario.
- Case Studies Work-books for students are prepared by the college for better understanding of the topic.
- Use of technology for effective learning.
- Through seminar, presentation and group discussion the communication skills of students are judged.

Teachers clarify and solve any problem raised by the students regarding the evaluation. Students can also inform the authorities in writing. Then a necessary step is taken if the grievance concerned is found genuine.

The college has the redressal cell for grievances regarding internal evaluation. The cell consists of the principal, chairman of the examination, and other faculty members. The student can apply to the cell for their grievance. The decision given by the cell is binding for all.

For the grievance of University evaluation, the University has deputed CEO at the college level who looks after grievances. The CEO in consultation with the Principal forwards the grievances to the University. Then the University settles the grievance as per its norms.






- Savitribai Phule Pune University has clearly stated the academic objectives in the syllabus provided for different faculties.

2.6.3 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

The following measures are taken to enhance social and economic relevance of the course:

- Basic computer literacy is compulsory to all the first year students, for that purpose college has registered MS-CIT center from MKCL.
- Every second year student has to complete course of English communication i. e. English Proficiency Course conducted by Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj's Academy for Communication in English, where a student has to pay Rs. 1000 and college contributes Rs. 1000 as course fees.
- The course of Environment awareness is compulsory for SYBCom/B.Sc. (Comp. Sci.) students. Our students undertake projects of Environment Awareness.
- The college has conducted Skill Development Programme for students under Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana.
- In collaboration with Rotary club of Nashik, our college has established CMCS Rotaract Club for various social and environment related activities.
- Through NSS, students are encouraged to participate in social activities.
- Research work for BBA and BCom students.
- The College organizes industrial visits, expert lectures, workshops, various competitions (Debate/Elocution), exhibitions, funfair etc. to enhance social and economic relevance.
- 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Student performance and learning outcomes are studied and analyzed with the help of performance and score secured by the student in internal evaluation test and term end marks. All this data is collected and analyzed by course in-charge. The analyzed data

helps the teacher to identify knowledge gap, advance learners, slow learners and thus helps design and plan remedial classes.

- Question Paper Sets are made available to students.
- Students' grievances are redressed.
- Internal answer books are checked and shown to the students.
- Result analysis is a way to monitor student performance
- Remedial coaching is planned for slow learners.

Following measures are adapted by the college to insure monitoring and achievement of learning outcomes

- The issues of teaching and learning are discussed in Local Management Committee meet.
- Constant assessment of students.
- Through internal examination, project and practical.
- The necessary teaching and learning equipment, books etc. are produced as per the need.
- Examination data is collected and results are analyzed in a systematic way. Remedial lectures are scheduled for those who show weak performance in the exam. Additional exercises and assignments are given to improve learning.
- The attendance record is maintained carefully. The meeting of parents teachers are arranged.
- The college organizes short term certificate courses and skill based training programmes for students.

Yes, the overall performance is judged by asking question during classes, conducting objective tests, internal evaluation and tutorials. The practical sheets are also checked during practicals. The college organizes various skill oriented and short term certificate courses, guest lectures and workshops for students.



- To develop physically, emotionally, culturally & educationally competent human resources
- To provide education for sustainable development of society by enabling students acquire the knowledge, skills, attitudes & values necessary to shape their future
- To create globally competent manpower for meeting the present & future industrial and social demands
- Committed to work for the well-being & happiness of common masses

The institute takes necessary care to ensure that the vision and mission is reflected in all the activities of the college. The college provides excellent education and opportunities to experiment and participate in all activities for personalized growth. Even the students are encouraged to contribute in various extension activities for betterment of the society. The college has introduced various skill oriented courses, enrichment courses and industrial visits for students. It tries to make our students morally strong and globally competent.

Upholding the motto of parent institute बहुजन हिताय बहुजन सुखाय (Bahujan Hitaya, Bahujan Sukhaya) a means for the welfare and happiness of the masses, the college is committed to provide higher education opportunities to all socially under-privileged and financially weaker sections of the society.

The college actively works for the Environment Awareness and has introduced various eco-friendly activities.

The college has established Training and Placement Cell and Competitive Examination Guidance Cell to develop competent human resources.

The college Women Welfare Committee, Board of Student Welfare and Grievance Redressal Cell work for the women empowerment by organizing various guest lectures, counseling sessions and workshops.

The college encourages staff members and students for using Information Communication Technology (ICT) like computers, laptops, projectors, CDs, Smart boards etc. for effective teaching and learning.

The vision and mission of the college is communicated to staff, stakeholders and students through the college prospectus, college board and the website of the college.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The institution, C.M.C.S. college is governed by the Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj. The top management, the principal and the staff/faculty always step in together for designing and correct applications of the quality policy and plans. The Principal calls meeting of the college staff to discuss various policy matters and their application and adjudication. The Principal ensures that all university related tasks are done within given time as per norms. The Principal provides academic leadership in association with the various faculties, evolves strategies for academic growth. The principal tries to utilize fund in a proper way, for which the university guidelines are used. The principal also tries to design quality policy for overall organization development. The principal communicates the problems and important decisions to the management.

The faculty is actively involved in decision-making process. The teachers hold periodic meetings. The recommendations of coordinators of various Committees are submitted to the principal and the principal arrives at suitable decisions for implementation. Few, namely two faculty members, in the capacity of teacher representatives, are members of the Local Management Committee. Hence they are actively involved in the decision-making process to sustain and enhance quality of education imparted by the institution.

Faculty members contribute in planning college activities. Faculties are members of IQAC and help in design, planning and execution of activities such as admission process, academic calendar, teaching plan, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. For quality maintenance, the feedback is taken from students and stakeholders and analyzed carefully and implemented in decision and planning.

The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated Mission:

The principal coordinates various programs through the committees constituted for the said purpose comprising of teaching, non-teaching staff and students. The Principal and two faculty members are also the part of Local Management Committee (LMC) who contribute in making plans and frame the policies.

Facilitated and supported by staff, the Head of the institution plays the leading role in governance and management of the institution. It is the principal communicates the vision and mission to the faculty and plans accordingly with the help of the other bodies. The principal who ensures transparency in the functioning of the college and maintains core values. The principal monitors the step wise implementation of the institutional plans. The principal takes care of both the academic and administrative planning of the college.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

The governing body, Local Management Committee (LMC) the Principal and IQAC design the action plans for all the operations and work of the college. The faculty in charge of various events of the institution prepares the action plan in consultation with the respective head of the department, which is then sanctioned by the principal. The management also checks if the action plan falls in line with the institutional mission and institutional strategic policies. It also ensures flexibility in the strategic plans in order to

incorporate innovative and practical ideas. The plans are prepared for the admission process, academic calendar, teaching activities, campus development etc. for the academic year.

Interaction with stakeholders:

The college interacts with its students through a feedback mechanism and suggestion box. The faculties meet parents durring parent teacher meetings. The extension activities of the college connect the institution with the society. It also ensures that proper feedback is received from these stakeholders and augments the academic policies through staff meeting to management. The management ensures an open door policy for interacting with the various stakeholders so that they can freely communicate their ideas, suggestions or grievances to the management. The alumni meet is also part of the interaction with stakeholders.

The college promotes the use of ICT tools such as computer, internet, e-books, LCD projectors and smart boards.

The college has provided number of activities to the students apart from excellent education. The college is one of the competent colleges of Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj. The reasons behind that are as follows.

The management is always supportive and provides necessary help for quality maintenance.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The college has the Local Management Committee (LMC) and different committees for planning and implementing academic and co-curricular and extension activities. The meetings of LMC and various committees and department heads are held whenever required.

Feedbacks are taken from stakeholders through various meetings, and feedback is received from stakeholders, the Principal and IQAC formulate various policies for curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the college.

The following procedure is adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate the policies and plans.

- To call staff meeting: The principal calls general staff meeting for discussing various issues with staff for improvement of quality policies.
- The principal forms various committees to run curricular and extra-curricular activities and appoints coordinator for smooth working.
- **Department meeting:** Related to departmental work such as syllabus completion, internal examination, organization of guest lecture, workshop, best practices, head of the department organizes meeting.
- IQAC: IQAC plays an important role in internal development of the college. The policies adopted by IQAC improves the quality of the institution. The work of various committees, department is observed and accessed by IQAC.
- To call Local Management Committee meeting: These meetings are held for quality improvement regarding suggestions.
- The issues such as discipline, syllabus completion, grievances and solutions etc. are discussed by Principal.

The college has an effective internal coordination. The Principal, Head of the Department, IQAC coordinator, Physical Director and Coordinator of various committees coordinate college activities. CEO and examination committee work for effective conduct of all examination. At the end of the year audited reports of the college, progress and confidential reports of staff members are sent to the parent institution.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The top management ensures that properly qualified and experienced staff must be the principal and head of department. They play effective role in providing academic leadership to the community. Faculty members take the academic lead to drive the activities to implement the policies and plans through the platform of various committees. The academic leadership provided by the top management is as follows:

- a. Local Management Committee:
 - As per University norms college has appointed two faculty members and one support staff member on the Local Management Committee of the college. They participate in the meeting at the LMC and contribute in the planning and development of the college.
- b. The college appoints College Examination Officer (CEO) for smooth conduct of the internal and external examination.
- c. The IQAC / NAAC steering committee coordinator is appointed by the principal of the college in consultation with top management.
- d. The college appoints senior and experienced faculty member as Academic and Research Coordinator to encourage research culture in the organization.
- e. NSS Program Officer and Board of Student Welfare Officer is appointed in the college for the welfare of the students and for extension activities.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

As per University norms there is a provision of two faculties and one support staff member on LMC of the college. These representatives are nominated through staff. They contribute in LMC and are involved in decision making. The Principal decentralizes the administration of the college into different committees; faculty members have to play the important role.

Every teacher kept as a mentor for a class. Faculty members are also nominated as incharge of various academic as well co-curriculum activities like Senior Supervisor for examination, Head of Cultural Committee, Training and Placement Officer, NSS Program Officer, Student Welfare Officer, Coordinator for Research and Development Committee.

The CEO is responsible for all exam related work.

The faculty is also appointed as IQAC / NAAC steering committee coordinator.

Academically excellent students appointed as representatives of their respective classes based on the performance in the Board exams and the University exams.

The college also provides opportunities to student in committees.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the Departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?



6.2.3. Describe the internal organizational structure & decision making process.

Organizational structure:



The principal of the college plays an important role in the decision making process. The principal conducts the meeting of Head of the department, IQAC and faculty members to discuss various issues. The important decisions of the meeting are discussed in the Local Management Committee (LMC) meeting for suggestion and approval. The suggestions and decisions of LMC meetings are communicated to the management for final decision. After the approval from the management, decisions are implemented.

Some important decisions regarding the college are taken by the principal as per norms.

The Head of department conducts department meeting and important decisions are communicated to faculty members. In some cases Head of the department has authority to take the final decision.

6.2.4 Give broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following-

- Industry interaction

1) **Teaching and Learning**:

For effective teaching learning the college has developed various strategies which improve the quality.

The admission for various courses is based on students previous examination marks. The rules of Savitribai Phule Pune University and state government are strictly followed for students admission. The management has appointed qualified faculty for effective teaching. For proper understanding of the topic along with lecture methods, presentations, discussion, seminar, workshop, industrial visits etc. are organized by the college.

The college promotes ICT tools like computer, internet, LCD projector, CDs and e-books to enhance the quality of teaching and learning.

The IQAC Cell of the college guides the staff members regarding quality teaching and research work. The principal supports and encourages faculty to attend seminar, workshops, refresher and orientation courses to update the knowledge.

The students feedback as well as the feedback of stakeholders is also used for effective teaching and learning. The college evaluates the performance of the staff by self appraisal method. The college library has rich collection of books for the staff and students.

2) Research and development:

The management and college always supports research publication and extension activities. Though the college does not have recognized research center, staff members are actively involved in research. The college has one Ph. D. and two M. Phil. teachers and seven teachers are pursuing their Ph.D. Many of the faculty members have published research papers in various national and international

conferences as well as published papers, journals. The college provides library facilities, ICT classrooms, well equipped laboratories to staff for research work.

3) Community engagement:

- The college always prefers to contribute in various social activities. As a social responsibility, under National Service Scheme (NSS) students participated seven days Shram Sanskar Shibir for cleanliness of pilgrimage Trimbakeshwar on the oaccasion of Khumbhmela.
- The college organizes Blood Donation Camps for Medical Checkup and Tree Plantation.
- The college whole heartedly participates in donation to orphans and backward people by giving donation to 'Vanvasi Kalyan Ashram', 'Adharashram', 'Adhartirth Adharashram'.
- Through Rotaract Club college promotes various community engagement related activities.

4) **Human resource management:**

The top management of Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj always tries to appoint qualified staff to improve quality. The faculty members are encouraged to participate in various seminars, conferences and research activities. The institution motivates the teachers for improving their quality. The teachers who completed M. Phil / Ph. D and qualified SET or NET or published research paper are felicitated in Annual Prize Distribution and Samajdin. The Head of the department carefully pays attention on department work and smooth conduct of the teaching learning process in coordination with the faculty members.

5) <u>Industry visits</u>:

Every year college organizes industrial visit for BBA students and even for some practical subjects of B.Com. The campus interviews are organized for the students and last year M.Sc. (Comp. Sci.) students have to complete industrial training of six months. The college organizes various lectures, workshops under guidance of Industry Experts. In this way student interact with industry. The college's local management committee member Mrs. Ranjanatai Patil always provides guidance to us about industry & industrial visit planning. She is the owner of an industry. The job requirement & current curriculum is always discussed in front of students so that maximum students can get benefit of it. In this way college improves quality.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders to review the activities of the institution?

The college principal and the top management are always in contact with each other. One member of IQAC is selected from local management committee therefore the efforts of quality improvement are always updated. The periodical reports are submitted to governing body by the principal. The LMC meeting is conducted twice in the year. The various activities are conducted in college and information is communicated to students through notice boards or oral instructions in the classrooms. The students' absent reports, poor result, organization of parents meet, annual prize distribution etc. information is communicated to parents by letter or by direct interaction with parents. The college organizes parents meeting, alumni meeting to discuss the improvement strategies. The principal communicates staff information to management also. The staff is involved in various committees and management supports the staff for their work. Feedback is taken from staff, students and other stakeholders regarding curriculum teaching, infrastructure regularly revise institute activities.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage & support involvement of the staff in improvement of the effectiveness & efficiency of the institutional process?

The staff plays an important role in effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. The management always encourages staff to contribute in institution process. The suggestions from the staff are always considered and meetings are conducted to discuss various issues. The management and principal always try to encourage staff to increase their involvement in various activities such as research, NSS, workshops, seminars, study tours, sports and extracurricular activities. The college provides duty leaves and financial support to staff for publishing research paper in national and international conferences or in Journals. The principal gives information to management regarding staff participation in various activities.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the management council in the last Year and the status of implementation of such resolutions?

The resolutions made by the top management in 2014-15 are as follows:

- Management has given increment in the salary to teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Management has done the process of payment fixation of staff which were appointed on clock hour basis.
- The scheme of 'Sevak Kalyan Nidhi' is introduced to staff members. Cr. No. – 538/2013-14.

The resolutions made by the Local Management Committee are as follows:

Meeting 1:

- To appoint more non teaching staff in the college.
- To appoint approved senior teaching staff for postgraduate course.
- To make parking shed for students vehicle.
- To implement tree plantation prgrammes.

Meeting 2:

- Partition of computer laboratories for proper utilization of space &give more time for practice to students.
- Establishment of various departments.
- ICT classrooms.
- To Purchase 50 computers.
- To purchase additional reference books in the library.

All the points were discussed in meetings and implemented.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If yes, what are? The efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

The university has the provision for autonomy status but college is not eligible to apply for autonomy status.

6.2.9 How does the institute ensure that grievances /Complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The college has established Grievance Redressal Cell. This Cell has a mechanism to attend, analyze and resolve complaints or grievances. The suggestion box is maintained in the main premise of the college. The suggestions from students are regularly attended by the committee members and resolved as per the provision of redress. The complaints from parents are also considered by the principal or head of the department concerned and necessary actions are taken against the complaints.

6.2.10 During the last 4 years, had there been any instances of court cases filled by and against the institute? Provide details on the issue and decision of the courts on these?

No court cases have been filed against the institution in the last 4 years.

6.2.11 Does the institution Have mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Yes, the college has a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performances. The college receives the suggestions and feedback about the institutional performance along with the activities and achievements carried out in the academic year. The feedback forms are filled by alumni and students. Students give there feedback by filling forms and suggestions in the suggestion box. Those suggestions and feedback are analyzed by respective committee members. These suggestions are informed to IQAC members for the improvement of institutional performance. IQAC members recommend

the suggestions to person concerned. The principal takes feedback from IQAC Cell. Sometimes the principal interacts with the students.

Outcome:

- The effective communication between students and institution takes place.
- Through feedback teaching learning quality, evaluation process becomes more effective.
- Teachers self introspection leads towards progress.

Response:

- The students feedback taken at the end of year was analyzed by each department carefully.
- The Principal and Head of the department take necessary steps for improvement of quality for their respective departments.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

The College with the help of the parent institute takes necessary efforts to enhance the professional development of staff members.

- Promoting the faculty for research work.
- Arranges faculty development program.
- Principal support to training program.
- Duty leaves for participation in workshop, seminar and conference.
- ICT tools are provided.
- Appreciation & felicitation for professional development.
- Encourages to pursue higher studies and research.
- Attend and present research papers in National/International conferences.
- Publish research papers in refereed journals.
- The institute organizes certain programs for non-teaching staff to improve their Skills such as Computer training, Tally, Orientation Course etc.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college organizes faculty development lectures. The various strategies adopted by the management of the college for the empowerment of its faculty (both teaching and non-teaching) are as follows:

- The college encourages to participate in various workshops, seminars, orientation and refresher course.
- The college encourages the faculty to undertake major / minor research projects of

- Savitribai Phule Pune University.
- For the participation in training program of NSS and soft skills.
- Teachers are encouraged for advanced research.
- 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The following mechanism is used to evaluate and ensure that a confidential record of the performance of every employee is maintained by the principal.

Annual Self-Assessment Report:

The college maintains annual staff assessment reports of all the employees. The report is in two parts:

Part A: It is to be filled up by teachers.

Part B: It is to be filled by Head of department; finally Principal gives his remark and forwards it to the parent Institution.

- Self-Appraisal: Performance is analyzed through self-appraisal method along with assessment by students.
- Student feedback: The feedback on performance of faculty are taken from students. The feedback forms are analyzed and information is used for improvement of faculty, teaching and learning.
- 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?
 - The role of management is very important in the performance self-appraisal of faculty.
 - The management takes appropriate decisions accordingly.
 - The principal's confidential report on the employees submitted to the top management is a key document that has a direct bearing on the deployment and redeployment of the staff in various positions and also in their promotional prospects.
- 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The following are a few welfare measures:

- Sevak Kalyan Nidhi is provided by parent institute. It provides financial supports to the member in case of natural calamity and harm.

- Nashik district college teacher co-operative society-The College employees are members of this co-operative society. The loan facility is provided to staff members.
- Felicitation of the faculty for the enrichment and best performances is done.
- Group Insurance Scheme is made available.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The college has a well-planned mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources. The policy decisions and utilization of financial resources are decided by the top management and the Principal. The college prepares budget of every head of income and expenditure. The major heads are salary, building maintenance, equipment, library, laboratories, sports, NSS etc. The principal of college takes various financial decisions with the help of all departmental heads, faculty coordinators, office superintendent. The major financial decisions are discussed in LMC meetings then forwarded to top management for approval. If top management approves, then principal decides how effectively and efficiently those financial resources should be utilized. The college accounts are audited every financial year and reports are given to the parent institute.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When the last audit done and what are the major audit objectives? Provide the details on compliance.

The college has system of internal audit. The internal audit is done by auditors appointed by the parent institute. After auditing the compliance reports are to be submitted to the parent institute. The last internal audit was done in financial year 2014 -15. No objections and queries were raised in it. As our institute is self-financed we are not receiving grants from state government so external audit is not done.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts /funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous 4 years and the reserved fund/corpus available with institutions, if any.

The institute is self-financed and the major funds available to institute are from annual fees of students and income generated by self-financed courses. The audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous 4 years is given in annexure. The college also receives some funds from Savitribai Phule Pune University under quality improvement program. Free ships and scholarships are provided to the students by state and central government.

6.4.4 Give details on efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and utilization of the same (if any).

The college has received the fund from Savitribai Phule Pune University under quality improvement program. The details of fund received and utilization of the same is as shown below:

- In 2014-15 fund of Rs. 16,000/- for special guidance lecture and girls students personality development from the Board of Students Welfare Savitribai Phule Pune University.
- The fund of Rs. 3,19,673/- is received from Savitribai Phule Pune University in October 2014 which is utilized for the construction of parking shed for staff and students vehicle parking.
- In 2014 the fund of Rs 3,500/- is received for girl students Hemoglobin test through Health Centre of Savitribai Phule Pune University.
- The fund of Rs. 1,93,754 /- was received from university in 2013 which is utilized for purchasing gym equipment & college computers.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

The academic quality of the institution is evaluated on the basis of the performance of the students in their examinations. Teachers judge the students academic abilities by way of question-answer and written tests in classes. The principal conducts meeting regularly and visits the classrooms to ensure proper delivery of the material and timely completion of course as per syllabus in time. Students play a major role in assuring quality of education imparted by the institution. They approach the teachers for the solution of their problems related to their syllabus.

Their participation is also assured by involving them in cultural and other activities. The students also approach the Principal directly for the redressal of their problems. The teachers are supportive to the academic needs of the students by offering reading materials and tutorials. The feedback form mechanism is also implemented for quality assurance of the teaching staff.

IQAC works for the maintenance of the quality of teaching learning and institutional activities. The IQAC of college decides the internal evaluation pattern, fixes time table, takes feedback from students, arranges education visits and plans remedial teaching etc.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The college has established Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in academic year 2014-15. The IQAC works for maintenance of quality, so management always provides guidance and support to its decisions.

The following decisions of IQAC are approved by the management:

- To arrange various skill development programmes for college students Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana through National Skill Development Corporation.
- Organization of various workshops, guest lecture for students.
- To arrange Eco-friendly activities in the college such as Tree Plantation, Eco-friendly product exhibition etc.
- To establish Counseling Cell.
- Partition of Laboratories.
- To purchase computers and reference book for the college library.
- To develop jogging track on the college ground.
- To establish Health Center and Competitive Exam Cell for students.
- ICT classrooms for effective teaching and learning.

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes. The IQAC have external members through LMC, alumni, parents and industry representative. The suggestions from the external experts of the IQAC committee are considered for modernization of curriculum, research and administration.

The students' University Representative gives us the feedback of the students and communicates required changes. We give due consideration to their suggestions. The Alumni committee is part of the college and their feedback helps us for improving our academics and support services. The students play the role of active learners who help in creating systems according to their needs and requirements. They make suggestions regarding improvement in teaching-learning process, examination system, day-to-day facilities like library services etc. They are also informed about the decisions taken or policies made by IQAC for their welfare through notices and announcements etc. As far as the alumni of the college are concerned, IQAC makes special efforts to involve them in the college programme.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?




- Internal evaluation through examination committee.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalization.


Integrated Framework of Academic Activities:

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Yes, the college provides training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance through Faculty Development Programme. The lectures of experts are organized for the guidance of faculty. The IQAC members are deputed to participate in IQAC related workshops, short term trainings and seminars.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The institution is affiliated with the Savitribai Phule Pune University. The university has its set mechanism to audit the academic working of the college. The university every year sends a team of the experts as Local Inquiry Committee to conduct academic audit. The team visits the college and very minutely observes the working of the institution in all its aspects. The committee then comments on the performance and thereby suggests the important changes required. As recommendation given by LIC, the college fulfills the requirements and sends the compliance to the university. Similarly the other type of audit

comes in the form of the team visiting the institution when any new course is introduced. This committee also gives remarks and suggests the necessary changes to the college. The college honestly adheres to the recommendations made by the committees.

The internal academic audit is done by the Principal and the Head of Departments concerned. This is a continuous exercise being done at least once in a month by conducting meetings. The Principal / Head verify the academic records, attendance register and the teacher diaries maintained by the faculty. The Principal and Head also review the completion of syllabus and other programs from time to time. The management of the parent institute pays visits to the college and looks into various academic aspects, infrastructure facilities etc.

6.5.5 How is the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University, the external regulatory authority is the affiliating university. The university appoints Local Inquiry Committee (LIC) for academic audit. The suggestions of LIC are taken into consideration for the compliance and then college sends the report to the university. The university ensures compliance.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

IQAC in consultation with the Principal works for teaching, learning and evaluation method and outcome.

Structure:

The Principal and Head of the department ensure that teaching and learning process is followed as per the university guidelines. At the end of the term / semester the internal assessment and term end examinations are arranged. The results and attendance are submitted to the head of the department. The university examination result is analyzed very carefully. The necessary suggestions are given to the teachers for improvement.

Methodology of operations:

The faculty members conduct test, quizzes, presentation and discussion for the effective learning of the student. Attendance for the lectures is compulsory and every teacher pays attention on the regular attendance of the students. The college organizes various teachers workshop for effective implementation of the curriculum. The college organizes remedial teaching for slow learners.

Outcome:

The effectiveness of academic programs and activities is based on the feedback (response) and result of the students. The result analysed and feedback data is used by the faculty to plan and to improve academic programs under the guidance of the top management.

6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution communicates its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to internal stakeholders in meetings conducted time to time. The external stake holders are made aware of the quality policies, vision and mission through personal discussion, college magazine, and college website. The institution has evolved stakeholders by forming different committees like IQAC and various functions of the college, alumni, parent teacher meet etc. with participation of students. The IQAC in the planning process considers feedbacks collected from all the stakeholders to prepare perspectives planning of development. The suggestion box is also made available to get students feedback.

INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

- The college does not have a mechanism to conduct green audit but tries to maintain green campus.
- The college takes efforts to maintain eco-friendly campus.
- Even necessary care is taken during construction of the college building to protect existent trees. The students learn in the surrounding of the nature.
- The college is actively involved in the tree plantation.
- A separate gardener is appointed for maintaining the green campus. In the absence of gardener the college non-teaching staff (peon) works for cleaning and maintaing green campus.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college has taken several initiatives to make the campus eco-friendly such as:

Energy Conservation:

The college has airy and well ventilated classrooms so we hardly need any artificial lighting. In the class rooms we have fixed the boards of 'Switch Off Light And Save Electricity' to create awareness among the students regarding energy conservation. The college staff is aware about the importance of energy so time-to-time they provide their guidance to the students. The college has conducted Energy Audit for proper utilization of energy.

Use of renewable energy:

The college is using solar lights in parking. The college is planning to fix solar panel for the use of electricity.

Water harvesting:

The college has developed the system of the rain water collection. The rain water is stored in the tank and used for plants in the college campus.

Check dam construction:

In collaboration with Rotary Club of Nashik the college has established CMCS Rotaract club. Through Rotaract Club the college is planning for check dam construction.

Efforts for carbon neutrality:

The college tries to maintain the campus environment friendly. The college has taken up certain steps to prevent the emission of carbon. The college has celebrated World Environment Day as 'No Vehicle Day' by using public transportation for travelling. Instead of owned private vehicle staff used public transportation on this day. It was to save the environment by decreasing pollution at least for one day.

Tree Plantation:

The college always conducts various activities for green campus. On the occasion of "Prerana Din" (7 October-Death anniversary of Late. Sarchitnis of MVP Dr. Vasantrao N. Pawar) representative from management, the Principal and head of various departments did tree plantation in the college parking. The college students have planted and adopted 25 trees on the campus. We are also planning for natural parking shade for girl students which is recommended by our Local Management committee (LMC) members.

• Hazardous Waste Management:

As our college does not run pure science faculty (biology, chemistry etc.) we have not developed technique for hazardous waste management. The college has fixed fire extinguisher which are handled with great care.

E-Waste Management:

The college has E-waste management system. Whatever e-waste material is available in computer laboratories, we handover it to the Electronics laboratory. In Electronics laboratory students use it for practicals and understanding the layout of hardware.

7.2 Innovations

• Hands Towards Help:

The college is whole heartedly involved in various social activities. The staff and students actively participate in charity work.

- a. The college staff voluntarily collected Rs.100/- each. The total amount of Rs.2500/- is used for giving one time lunch to orphans of Adharashram at Ashok stambh, Nashik.
- b. The college has collected various things necessary for day to day purpose from students such as soaps, notebooks, foodgrains etc. The collected things are donated to childrens of Adhatirth Adharashram located at Anjeneri near Trimbkeshwar. This Adharashram is specially started for orphaned children of those farmers who committed suicide.
- c. The college staff has voluntarily donated Rs.2100/- to 'Vanvasi Kalyan Ashram'. This organization is actively working for tribal people.

Eco friendly innovations:

a. No Vehicle Day:

The college has celebrated World Environment Day as 'No vehicle day'. All staff members and students gave preference to use public transport facility for travelling rather than owned vehicles.

b. Eco-friendly products exhibition:

The college has celebrated Maratha Vidya Prasarak's Samajdin by organizing eco-friendly products exhibition. Students actively participated in this exhibition. Through exhibition students have tried to create awareness regarding eco-friendly environment.

c. Eco-friendly Lord Ganesha:

The college has arranged two days workshop for making eco-friendly Lord Ganesha idol. The idols of Lord Ganesha were created by using degradable shadu soil. One of the college students has guided the participant students and staff members for making Ganesha idol. Students and faculty members have actively participated in this workshop and also used handmade idols for celebrating Lord Ganesha festival at their home.

Academic Innovations:

a. Parent Counseling:

The college has organized parent counseling for the parents of students. The main purpose of arranging this counseling was to create awareness among parents about development of their children. Principal Dr. Ashwinikumar Bharadwaj a well known person from the field of psychology has provided his guidance on the following topics:

- Communication gap between parents and children
- Behavioral Self Control
- Health and Hygiene
- Social media addiction and prevention

b. Competitions:

The college always provides platform for talent of students by organizing various kind of competitions such as:

1. Economica:

The college has organized General Knowledge based Quiz competition 'Economica'. The aim of this competition is to create interest about Economics in young minds. The competition is also useful for preparation of various competitive examinations.

2. Programming:

The college arranges computer programming language competition for students of computer stream. This competition is useful to prepare the students for campus interview process.

3. Quiz Mania:

The college has organized Quiz competition "Quiz mania" for commerce students. It is based on the basic knowledge of core Commerce subjects, language proficiency and general knowledge. This competition is specially conducted for creating awareness about various competitive examinations as well as current trends in commerce.

c. E-Commerce Certificate Course:

The department of Commerce has started short term certificate course in E-Commerce to create awareness among the students about the field of E-Commerce. This course helps to provide information about new avenues in E-Commerce to students. The course included lectures, demonstration and small practical work related to E-Commerce. Eminent persons were called to deliver the lectures.

d. Commerce Corner:

To create awareness among students in the field of Commerce, to give exposure to their creativity, to provide them current and updated knowledge about commerce, Commerce department has started Late. Dr. Vasantrao N. Pawar Commerce Corner. The college has celebrated the 'World Marathi Language Day' (Kavivarya Kusumagraj Birth Anniversary) by displaying various poems of Kusumagraj in the corner.

e. Vachan Sanskruti Savvardhan Abhiyan (Reading Culture Movement):


